### **First-Year Greek I GK 506 (32825) Fall 2009**

This class is an introduction to the Classical Greek language. We'll learn the Greek alphabet and basic vocabulary, morphology, syntax, and pronunciation. Exercises will consist of reading/translating, writing, and pronouncing simple passages in Greek. In addition to the midterm and final exam, there will be frequent, short assignments and periodic quizzes—which will always be announced beforehand—to test forms, vocabulary, and progress in reading ability. By the end of the semester, you should be able to enjoy reading continuous passages of Greek.
