The NSP is open to students from all academic disciplines.
(No foreign language is required.)

The NSP is divided into two segments:

Part I – 14 weeks of instruction on the UT campus offered each spring semester focusing on the origins and history of WWII with guest lectures, films and excursions

Part II – 3-week tour of WWII-related sites in Europe: London, Paris, Normandy, and Berlin

Program Costs

There is a \$2,500 program fee that covers lodging, ground transportation and other program costs in Europe. Students are expected to pay for their airline tickets, tuition and fees for all UT courses. Additional expenses will include fees for medical insurance, passport, food, and emergency funds.

Scholarship funds will be made available from the program upon application. Students accepted by the program who can demonstrate insufficient financial resources can apply to the program for financial assistance, if they receive no other funding from outside sources. Students are encouraged, however, to seek funding from other sources first.

Please note that most scholarship deadlines for the spring semester are October 1. Therefore, you will need to apply for scholarship aid before the NSP application deadline of Monday, October 5, 2009.
