About *The Review*

The Review of Litigation is a law journal of national scope devoted to issues affecting litigation. As the first journal devoted exclusively to topics related to trial and appellate advocacy, *The Review* annually publishes four issues containing articles and notes on evidentiary, procedural, and substantive issues. Recently, *The Review* has published articles on a wide variety of litigation-related topics, from intellectual property to Constitutional law.

Recent Developments

A Washington and Lee University study ranked *The Review* as the second most-cited student-edited specialty journal in terms of U.S. and state court citations. *The Review* is also the fourth most-cited specialty journal of any kind. In fact, U.S. and state courts cite *The Review* more often than many general-interest law reviews, including the *UCLA Law Review* and the *Emory Law Journal*. In the past year, *The Review* has been cited sixteen times by federal and state courts, including the Southern District of New York, the District for the District of Columbia, and the Seventh Circuit (in an opinion by Judge Posner). Consistent citations in court opinions strengthen *The Review's* reputation as a leading law journal with a national scope and audience.

The Review's 2007 symposium, *Products Liability: Litigation Trends on the 10th Anniversary of the Third Restatement*, was a great success. Participants included Federal District Judge Sam Sparks and Texas Supreme Court Justice Dale Wainwright, as well as internationally renowned scholars from the University of Texas, Stanford, Fordham, Chicago-Kent, and University of South Carolina law schools. *The Review* expects the 2008 symposium to be just as successful.
