

Application for Concordia University Continuing Education Unit for Attending the UT Ethics Conference

The content of the UT Ethics Conference has been reviewed by The Vice President of Academic Services of Concordia University at Austin and preapproved for Continuing Education Units (CEUs). The present form must be filled out completely and mailed, with a \$10 processing fee, to the Academic Office, Concordia University, 3400 N. Interstate 35, Austin, TX 78705. When the application is received, Concordia University will award the CEUs directly upon verification of attendance with the Registrar of the UT Ethics Conference.

1. The University of Texas Ethics Conference, April 15-17, 2004, LBJ Auditorium on the UT campus is sponsored by the Center for Ethical Leadership, LBJ School for Public Affairs, UT Austin. Co-sponsorship comes from several other components of UT Austin, the Center for Ethics and Leadership, St. Edwards University, Huston-Tillotson College, Concordia University at Austin, and LeTourneau University in Austin.

2. The purpose of The University of Texas Ethics Conference is to engage the academic and public communities in an increasing awareness of the need and resources for ethics instruction and ethical living in the complexity of our times.

3-4. The UT Ethics conference consists of a series of lectures and discussions of various aspects of ethics. The emphasis is on the basis for ethical judgments and behavior. The following sessions of the conference are certified for CEU credits. The applicant should check the sessions at which he or she was in attendance. Each of these sessions is credited with 0.1 CEU credits.

- Lecture by Aine Donovan, "Ethical Marginalia - How Educators Shape a Civic Vision"
- Paper Sessions #1 (State which session you attended)
- Lecture by Dallas Willard, "Ethical Knowledge in the Academy before G. E. Moore"
- Paper Sessions #2 (State which session you attended)
- Lecture by David Novak, "Can there be Common Moral Norms in a Multi-Cultural Context?"
- Friday evening panel discussion by plenary speakers
- Lecture by Dallas Willard, "Beauty and the Nature Above 'Nature' in C.S. Lewis' 'Abolition of Man'"
- Lecture by Peter Kreeft, "Universities as Orcs: The Abolition of Man by the Hand of Academia?"
- Lecture by Frederica Mathewes-Green, "Does Character Matter?"
- Panel discussion to summarize the conference

5-7. The intended audience for the UT Ethics Conference, for Friday, is primarily academics, but the material is suitable for any professional. The intended audience for the Saturday component is the general public, but the level is suitable for any professional. The speakers at the conference are national recognized speakers and authors, and clearly are qualified to address the topics covered in their lectures and panel discussions.
