THE DESTINATION

Cádiz, Spain — Considered the oldest city in Europe, Cádiz was founded in 1100 BC by the Phoenicians. It has been a Spanish city since the 13th century, but Carthaginians, Romans, Visigoths, and Moors ruled Cádiz previously. Columbus sailed from Cádiz on two of his voyages to the Americas. During the 18th century, the city prospered as Spain's primary port for trade with the Americas, and many of the lyrics of flamenco music from Cádiz reflect people's experiences traveling to and from the New World.

A few of Cádiz's many cultural highlights include: the Oratorio de la Santa Cueva, which houses some works by Goya; the Museo de Cádiz, which exhibits works by Rubens and Francisco de Zurbarán, as well as archaeological collections of ancient Phoenician, Greek and Roman ruins; and the ornate Baroque Catedral Nueva, which was built during the 18th century.

Cádiz, with a population of 160,000, has plenty to offer students. The entire casco antiguo, the old section of the city, is an enchanting area to explore on foot. Unique barrios abound, each with its own character, plaza, tapas bars, and outdoor cafes, from which students can appreciate the pleasant summer weather. Pretty beaches are never more than a ten-minute walk away. The charming and friendly nature of the gaditanos, as the locals are called, is one of the most welcoming aspects of Cádiz and one that make Cádiz an ideal location in Spain for learning Spanish.

SPANISH LANGUAGE AND CULTURE IN CÁDIZ

This intensive program aims to significantly improve your knowledge of the Spanish language, including your ability to speak correctly and effectively outside the classroom and to integrate you as much as possible into the local culture.

Students take six hours of coursework taught at the Universidad de Cádiz. One course is taught by a UT faculty member; local professors teach all others. Students are in class for roughly three hours per day, Monday through Thursday, for approximately six weeks. Only one summer session is offered in Cádiz. Students interested in extending their stay in Spain may consider studying in Santander for the second session. Those who do will benefit from a full Spanish experience and a small program discount.

To maximize cultural immersion, students live with carefully selected local families and sign a pledge stating that they will speak only Spanish while at home and at the university. Students eat lunch, the biggest and most important meal of the day, with their host families. There are two students per household. The opportunity to live with host families usually proves to be students' favorite part of their experience abroad.

In addition to cultural activities and educational excursions* within and around Cádiz, the program fee includes a day long excursion to Sevilla and an overnight trip to Granada. Also planned is an optional trip to Morocco during the program, for an additional fee; the trip will enable students to more fully experience the cultural roots of Andalusia.

PREDEPARTURE PREPARATION

Proper preparation is essential to every study abroad experience. All UT summer programs have a significant and mandatory predeparture orientation component during the spring semester preceding participation. The orientation program, which includes presentations by both the faculty leaders and C-GEO staff, is designed to introduce students to the academic, cultural and personal aspects of studying abroad.

- The program fee includes accommodation, most meals, field trips, program activities, guest lectures, and international health insurance.
- Students will register for two, first-session Cádiz courses during summer registration for a total of six hours. Those who want to extend their stay in Spain may elect to attend the program in Santander for second session.

Financial Aid: Students' financial aid awards may be applied towards the cost of the program. Summer session financial aid packages can be recalculated based on the additional costs of the program. Questions regarding financial aid should be directed to your C-GEO Study Abroad Advisor.

Students not currently using financial aid, who are interested in applying for it, are encouraged to do so. For summer financial aid, students must complete the FAFSA by February 15. See <http://finaid.utexas.edu/index.html>.
